Chile D2D Visit

A team of eight Rotarians was selected for the District-to-District (D2D) exchange that went to Rotary District 4355 in southern Chile for two weeks in December.

This year's team consisted of:

- Lisa Engel, team leader,
- Galen Engel, both from the Broken Arrow club,
- John Rains, District Governor Elect, Tulsa,
- Cathy Rains, Sapulpa,
- Sean Crider, Bella Vista,
- Les Crider, Mt. Vernon,
- Trish Kerkstra, North Tulsa, and
- Corbett Campbell, Broken Arrow.

The team arrived in Concepción, Chile on December 3rd, after a long trip. We were greeted very warmly by our hosts at the airport and whisked off to our homes for the next two nights. After a brief rest, our first presentation was that night. We each did five-minute PowerPoint presentations in Spanish and would do seven more during the trip. During our stay, we went to the Pacific coast to the small town of Arauco and were hosted for lunch by their Rotary club. Then to Lota, a coal mining town, and we toured the vast grounds of Isidora Goyenechea, one of the richest women in the world in the 1800's, who owned and managed the coal mines. While in Concepción, we also toured the hospital with the potential project that Miguel from the Chilean team talked about when he was in our district last April, the human milk bank project.

Next to Los Angeles (in Chile!) for two nights, where we went to a private auto museum, had a wonderful lunch

and listened to the Los Angeles club's presentation, and we presented as well. The District Governor-Elect, Marco Cid Toledo, is in that club. Two nights here and a wonderful breakfast send-off as we made our way to our next stop, Pucón, in Los Lagos (the lakes) region. Pucón is a wonderful little tourist town on the shores of Lake Llanquihue and in the shadow of Chile's most active volcano, Villarrica. We arrived in time for lunch and a short presentation to the club, then we went to Indomito, one of the thermal hot springs in the area. That was wonderful! The next day, our hosts took us up to the volcano and then to a private bonsai garden owned by one of the Rotarians, then a wonderful lunch with the club. Two nights in Pucón, then on to Temuco for two nights.

At the train museum we watched them moving some of the trains outside for summer. We visited a dental training clinic and a foster home for girls. The team wanted to do something for the girls, so we all donated money for their Christmas stockings before we left. Next to Puerto Octay, where Rudi, the Chilean chair of the D2D, lives. We visited a rural school with only nine students and watched them make presentations about plants, and then we all had snacks that their families made. Then on to Petrohue to see the amazing waterfalls. Puerto Octay is on Lake Llanguihue and you can see four snow covered volcanoes from there. It is amazing! Our hosts took us up to Osorno volcano and the views from there of the lake and the surrounding mountains were spectacular! We were there three nights, and saw Frutillar, a small very German town also on the lake. We had coffee at the Teatro del Lago, the most important cultural center in Chile.

On to the island of Chiloe, Chile's largest island. We took an extremely comfortable bus which then drove onto the ferry to take us to Chiloe, then continued the journey. Here the team split in half - four of us went to Ancud and four to Castro. Galen, Sean, Les and I were in Ancud and John, Cathy, Trish and Corbett were in Castro. Each city had team members that came to our district last year, Mario and Giacomo. In Ancud, we went to the coast and took a boat to see the penguins. It was amazing. The team in Castro had fantastic experiences, too, getting to see churches that are UNESCO world heritage sites. We all had wonderful hosts and experiences. Two nights and then back to the mainland and to Puerto Varas, where we spent one night before flying back home. There are two clubs in Puerto Varas, we had lunch with the Los Lagos club. Javier Hermosilla Kaschel, the current District Governor, is a member of that club. Both clubs hosted us for the evening



dinner, where we presented for the last time!

I encourage anyone interested in this awesome experience to apply for the next outbound trip, likely in November. Some Spanish is helpful, as many in Chile do not speak English. It is amazing to see how their clubs operate. Almost all meet in the evenings, sometimes for three to four hours, as there is much fellowship, a meeting, and dinner. Many of the clubs are male only, so there may be cards and cigars as well! The females are in a satellite club, and they call them the "Inner Wheel". They typically do projects together but meet separately. The Chilean people are very warm and friendly, and everything is paid for once you arrive. The airfare is your responsibility. Some team members paid for it themselves, and some clubs have helped with it. The incoming team from Chile will be here from mid-April to early May. If your club is interested in hosting them and having them give a presentation, please contact


It may take some effort to dig out the Rotary Alumni, but why not make the effort and invite them to your club?





February is Peacebuiding and Conflict Resolution Month



One of Rotary's many facets is a monthly focus, and in February we consider peace. As a humanitarian organization, peace is a cornerstone of our mission. We believe when people work to create peace in their communities, that change can have a global effect.

By carrying out service projects and supporting peace fellowships and scholarships, our members take action to address the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, discrimination, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.

Our commitment to peacebuilding today answers new challenges: how we can make the greatest possible impact and how we can achieve our <u>vision</u> of lasting change. We are approaching the concept of peace with greater cohesion and inclusivity, broadening the scope of what we mean by peacebuilding, and finding more ways for people to get involved.

Rotary's Four Roles in Promoting Peace

Rotary and its members are:

Practitioners: Our work fighting disease, providing clean water and sanitation, improving the health of mothers and children, supporting education, and growing local economies

directly builds the optimal conditions for peaceful societies.

- Educators: Our <u>Rotary Peace Centers</u> have trained more than 1,800 peace fellows to become effective catalysts for peace through careers in government, education, and international organizations.
- **Mediators:** Our members have negotiated humanitarian ceasefires in areas of conflict to allow polio vaccinators to reach children who are at risk.
- Advocates: Our members have an integral role as respected, impartial participants during peace processes and in post-conflict reconstruction. We focus on creating communities and convening groups that are connected, inclusive, and resilient.


