#### What's a RAGAP?



Last month's District Newsletter listed several RAGs- Rotary Action Group. But did you know there is an Action Group connected right here in District 6110?

Here's info on RAG AP from Larry Kenemore, of the Siloam Springs Rotary Club and RAG AP North American Chapter Leader:

RAG AP North America is a chapter of RAG AP RI. It was founded in 2022. During our first year, we reviewed the addiction and overdose crisis and compared that to the Polio issue along with how Rotary addressed it and was successful.

Out of that research came Project SMART®. Just as Polio was a Project so is Project SMART® for local Rotary clubs. Addiction and overdose are a local community issue and the Project is:

S-School Training - the first and only age-grade-based training program developed from Grade 1 through Grade 12 that trains children on what addiction is and why you would not want to become addicted.

M-Medicine and safe drug disposal/the first and only in-home safe drug disposal program where every home in a Rotary Clubs district is provided a bottle that holds 60 pills or liquids that safely neutralizes them in the bottle. Comes with postage paid envelope when mailed back and new bottle is provided.

A-Awareness - Local Rotary Clubs providing Naloxone Training and exclusive distributors of Kloxxado the first and only 8 mg. Naloxone available only through a local Rotary Club.

R-Recovery - Local Rotary clubs providing a database of Recovery/Rehab centers with their actual success rates. Citizens through the Local Rotary Club can access the database and see the actual success rate of an organization before they spend money on Recovery/Rehab. Actual success rates average 39% some only 8%.

T-Treatment RAP AP North America provides 24/7 telehealth treatment in every community that signs up for Project SMART. Handouts to police, fire, EMS, ER physicians, bars, restaurants with RAG AP QR code, where treatment with medication is provided immediately with an 85% success rate.

Currently, there are 371 Rotary Clubs that have Project SMART® Committees providing some or all of the programs. District 6110 has three clubs providing portions of the project; Siloam Springs, Parsons, and Fort Smith. The Siloam Springs Club has made the news for doing Naloxone Training in the community and is intimately involved with the School District in providing the teachers, school bus drivers, and food service workers with Naloxone Training.

The test club in Tallahassee, Florida proved the success of the Project. They were awarded Rotary's 2023 Service Above Self Award for being the only community in the United States that lowered their overdose deaths by 28%. This came from the club's training and distribution of Naloxone within that city including every school teacher, bus driver, and food service worker in the Leon County School District in addition to thousands of citizens.



He and his family moved to Venezuela in 1970, where he founded successful ventures in the petroleum industry. Pedro became deeply involved in community service and humanitarian projects, and served as the

Governor of Rotary District 4370 in 1996-97. He was subsequently a Rotary International leader in South America. Unfortunately, political unrest in Venezuela forced Pedro and his family to relocate to the U.S. in 2012. After settling in Oklahoma, he joined the Rotary Club of Tulsa in 2013. He and his late wife Estela became Major Donors and Bequest Society members in support of The Rotary Foundation. Pedro remains active in District 6110's College of Past District Governors, and is known for his friendliness and thoughtful enthusiasm.
