The Chileans are Coming in April to District 6110!

One of the most exciting new developments in District 6110 is the D2D (District to District) program that we established in 2023 with Rotary District 4355 of southern Chile. This relationship is the product of years of work by PDG Ellis Potter, the Iola, Kansas Rotary Club, and Rotary leaders in Chile.

The first delegation of six Rotarians from District 6110 made a two-week visit to Chile in December 2023, visited several Rotary Clubs there, and had a great experience. In April 2024, five leaders from District 4355 visited here for two weeks. My home Rotary Club in Nevada, Missouri was fortunate enough to host them for a day, and we had a memorable experience. Three months ago, our second delegation of eight D6110

Rotarians spent two weeks in southern Chile, led by D2D Chair Lisa Engel. They again had a transformative experience. Therefore, it was exciting to receive the itinerary of District 4355's second delegation to our District. The five (or possibly six) Chileans will arrive in Tulsa on Monday, April 21st, and will begin two weeks of whirlwind visits to Rotary Clubs and communities in District 6110 - including 9 in Oklahoma, 2 in Missouri, 1 in Kansas, and 8 in Arkansas.

We will also get to visit with them when they attend our Legacy Celebration and District Conference on May 2nd and 3rd, in Rogers, AR. If you have the opportunity to meet these impressive Rotarians, you will discover that we share the same goals - to make our communities, districts, and countries better, through altruistic service. That realization confirms the importance of international Rotary exchanges!

Shoes for Orphan Souls at MAPETS



Last Rotary year, District 6110 joined with the other Missouri Districts (6040, 6060, & 6080) to conduct a shoe drive, dubbed "Shoes for Orphan Souls." The project began over 20 years ago with then District Governor Larry Lunsford in Kansas City. Working together, the 4 districts collected more than 43,000 shoes and raised \$56,000! These shoes are sent by Buckner International to vulnerable children in Central America and Africa.

This Rotary year, every President-Elect is asked to bring shoes to MAPETS (Mid-America President-Elect Training Seminar) to continue the project. Larry Lunsford, now the Vice Chair of the Rotary Foundation, will speak at MAPETS and will be thrilled to see the project continued in the MAPETS Districts, (6110, 6150, 6170, and 5750) which include Missouri, Arkansas, Kansas, and Oklahoma.

ASK YOUR President-Elec if they need more shoes (the answer is yes) and help by providing new, close-toed youth shoes to be donated at MAPETS coming up very soon March 20-22.

Actually, EVERYONE attending MAPETS is

asked to bring shoes - Presidents-Elect, Nominees, Presenters, Evaluators, Facilitators, PDGs...basically anyone who shows up at MAPETS needs to bring shoes to help the service project...and help children that need shoes.

This is an easy way for your club to take part in an international project. Over the 20+ years that the project has been nurtured by Larry Lunsford, 438,139 children have received shoes! You can be part of that just by sending shoes with your President-Elect!



Legacy Campaign nears finish line



The District's Inaugural Legacy Campaign "Thermometer" has burst through the original \$2 Million Goal and now stands at \$3.1 Million in major gifts, pledges, and bequests. Whoo Hoo!

There is still time to join in the fun to be part of this record-breaking total with just a few weeks to send bequest pledges to Carl Davis (Carl.Davis@rotary.org or 847-424-5343) to make them part of our Legacy total. The campaign ends on 3/31/25, allowing us one month to do final confirmation and tabulation, with the totals to be announced at the Legacy Celebration Dinner on Friday evening, May 2nd! Contributions of \$10,000 are considered major gifts and can be paid over three years. A bequest of \$10,000 from your IRA or other fund is another way to support the Foundation's permanent endowment. And gifts of \$25,000 and above become a "Named Gift," with annual reports made to those so named. It's a great way for your kids or others to hear about what your legacy is doing for the world.

Remember these gifts are to the Rotary Foundation's permanent endowment, which provides good works *forever*. Based on \$3,000,000, we can reasonably expect the District to receive about \$90,000 EVERY YEAR for District grants etc. Now that is a legacy anyone would want to be a part of!

WHAT'S THIS ALL ABOUT: Annual giving towards Paul Harris Fellowships is great as about half of that money comes back to the District in three years. But then the pipeline is empty and must be refilled again the next year and so on. However, a gift to the Legacy Campaign Share goes to the Rotary Foundation Endowment's permanent fund, and returns about 3% every year in perpetuity. That's a lot of "Doing Good in the World!" Do you know about our District's newest club? Our "e-Club of Engagement" is less than two years old, but is already making a significant difference in the world. Engaging in international projects is often a problem for many clubs. A lot of uncertainty. Is this really a worthy project? Will it be managed responsibly, and will our money be spent wisely? How will we know for sure what the results are?

The Rotary e-Club of Engagement has a project to answer those questions. It's called the

Haiti Engagement Project. Organized as a club committee, the project formed a partnership with The Hope Foundation of Fort Smith to launch a small portfolio of curated projects that will appeal to the various interests of individual Rotarians and clubs. How does this project differ from most? It's in our motto: "Helping You Help Others". This is not just our e-club project, it is a campaign for Haiti that:

- (1) Is designed to attract broad Rotary engagement by clubs and individuals and
- (2) Can ensure Rotary's participation is responsibly conducted, transparent, and achieves the results intended.

So how do we do that? We select projects and establish relationships with carefully vetted partners that we know to be trustworthy and reliable. We fund most projects monthly, not in a lump sum. This allows us to monitor them closely and verify the results.


There are several Rotary clubs in Haiti, though many are not operating in the current dire situation. Recently, work was done through the Cap Haitien club on the north coast until the gangs took over. Currently, we are looking to work with the Rotary club in Jacmel, on the south central coast. We've corresponded with the president and assistant district governor of that club. We have NGO partners nearby that could stiffen up that relationship. But it takes time.

With support from Rotary, churches, and individuals, we currently have six projects in Haiti, which we are funding at about \$30,000 per year:

- With a special formulation, we can reverse severe, acute malnutrition in a child in eight weeks. We fund 60 children a year.
- Human trafficking is a heart-wrenching problem, and it flourishes in Haiti. We fund programs for trafficked children in two locations in Haiti.
- Due to the unrelenting killing of civilians by gangs, Haiti is filled with abandoned children. The government has cracked down on orphanages due to corruption and abuse and now favors foster care. We fund 12 children in foster care families.
- 30%-50% of gang members are children teens and preteens. The kids have no employable skills, no jobs, nothing to eat. They are sitting ducks for gang membership. We fund two projects to teach employable skills and entrepreneurship to young people, to produce food and income and to keep them out of gangs.
- · Clean water is a critical problem. We fund bio-sand filter

- systems for 36 new families a year.
- Haiti is an environmental disaster. We fund agroforestry projects to rebuild the soil and forests and to increase food production. Independent studies show we can reduce poverty by 50% with agroforestry projects.

Why Haiti? Our e-Club of Engagement encourages each member to serve in areas they know best. Haiti is something we know, and Haiti resonates with our members. I started working in Haiti in the 1970s, and was kidnapped while working on a Rotary water project in 2006. I've seen all the turmoil over these 45 years, but I have never seen Haiti so helpless. Ruled by gangs, with indiscriminate slaughter and senseless savagery, solutions are hard to find. But Service Above Self demands that we give it our best shot. Similarly, Merna Gill, our treasurer, has years of experience in Cuba. We plan to implement the same type of engagement project there. We have a lot of energy and can do the work, but we need support from other Rotary clubs and Rotarians to make it happen. This could be an excellent way for your club to engage in international service. Our club is engaged and growing. Formed 20 months ago by Clay Langley of the Sand Springs club, we have 21 members from four states -- average age 41.5. We have 11 new member applications – including one each from Cuba and Haiti. We documented 2,205 service hours in our first Rotary year and have over 2,500 hours documented for the first nine months of this year.

Rotary has a long and worthy history in Haiti, but these are desperate times. It is not a time to pull back.

We ask other clubs and individual Rotarians to work with us on this campaign. Pick a project where your heart is. We'll make it grow. This is our way of helping you help others – responsibly.

The 21st Wheelchair Project in Mexico

The "Wheelchair Project" was started by Noel Morris of the Springdale Rotary Club, and this was the 21st trip delivering wheelchairs. Some 29 District 6110 Rotarians and friends have just returned from Oaxaca, Mexico after delivering the gift of mobility to 50 people at the Children's Rehabilitation Institute TeletonUSA (CRIT) Oaxaca location, and 7 more wheelchairs were delivered to people at their homes. One of the homes was a communal living situation without running water.

The Oaxaca area Rotary District Governor and five Club Presidents from Oaxaca helped distribute chairs and joined our team for dinner one night. Thor Davidson, the current DG in the Illinois District surrounding the RI headquarters in Evanston, also attended. He began his Rotary journey at the Springdale Rotary Club when Noel invited him to join and wanted to see how the program had grown. This is the 21st trip for Noel Morris, 9th for Jill Arbuthnot, 8th for a few others. Often Rotarians bring their children or grandchildren along to "get a taste" of service in the real world. The trip is open to any District Rotarian, and if interested in the 2026 trip they should contact Noel.

Many of the recipients gave hand-made hearts or food items as thank-you gifts to the Rotarians. The people of Oaxaca were unfailingly friendly and helpful and the weather was beautiful! The project partners with the American Wheelchair Mission, led by Chris Lewis, the son of the late comedian/actor Jerry Lewis. Chris will be speaking at our District Conference in Rogers, AR this May 3rd.



It has impact on multiple people.


It **expands** our reach to those in need of chairs.


