On 1/16 Tim Hendricks spoke out against the casino being built and passed around petitions against it.







A child learns seventy-five percent of life's knowledge by the age of three or four. The concept of language for communication is developed long before school age, and if the early window is missed, it is rarely recouped. Without early language knowledge, the average reading level of a deaf adult has been only third grade. Happy Hands opens the world of communication to the deaf child and his family.
