This Week's Program -- February 11, 2025

St. Bernards Maternal Life 360 HOME

The Arkansas Department of Human Services (DHS) recently announced that St. Bernards Medical Center in Jonesboro will open the first Maternal Life360 HOME in Arkansas and provide services for women with high-risk pregnancies. Life360 HOME is an innovative program that supports women with high-risk pregnancies through home-visiting services during pregnancy and for up to two years after birth. The intensive support available through this program is aimed at improving health outcomes and health-related social needs like food security and housing, and as a result, the long-term health and well-being of women and babies.



The St. Bernards Maternal Life360 HOME is now serving women who are enrolled in Medicaid benefits in Craighead County. A second Life360 HOME at White River Medical Center in Batesville is expected to open in the near future, and it will serve women in Independence County, and additional Maternal Life360s are expected to follow in other hospitals around Arkansas. A woman is eligible for Maternal Life360 home-visiting services if she is enrolled in Arkansas Medicaid, has a diagnosis of high-risk pregnancy, lives in a Life360 service area, and is not currently receiving other state or federally funded home-visiting services.

Emily McGee, Vice President of Nursing and Women's & Children's Services for St. Bernards oversees this program. She is our speaker today.

Last Week's Program -- February 4, 2025

The Delta Gateway Museum

Our program this week was presented by Rotarian Gregory Hansen and honored the founding director Leslie Hester of the Delta Gateway Museum. He showed pictures of the museum's various exhibits, including pottery from the ancient civilization and collections of artifacts of the Mississippi Delta. He emphasized the museum's effort to connect people with their history and culture.

Located in Blytheville in the historic Kress Building, the Delta Gateway Museum collects, stores, maintains, and regularly exhibits historical and cultural objects, artifacts, photographs, works of art, printed materials, and audiovisual materials that relate to and emphasize the history and cultural development of our region, including Blytheville, Mississippi County, Northeast Arkansas, Southeast Missouri, and the Arkansas



Delta. Planned exhibits illustrate prehistoric and protohistoric Native American cultures; the importance of the timber industry and the development of cotton agriculture; the historical effects and continuing threat of earthquakes and flooding; the regional impact of the Air Force base and steel mills; and the development of river, rail, and highway transportation. Exhibits provide both literal and figurative explanations.

Leslie Hester spoke of the educational opportunities for regional school children, senior citizens, heritage tourists and tour groups. She emphasized that children who came to see the exhibits were excited to see them and learn from them. The museum was the place for meetings, retreats, classes, and workshops.

With the retirement of Hester last year, the museum is currently closed until a new director is found.
