A Dream of a Craighead County Museum

Craighead County is one of the few counties that doesn't have a museum. Claudia Shannon and Dr. Ruth Hawkins would like to change that. They want to preserve the history of Craighead County and remember the people who have made the county what it is today.

Both have experience in creating museums: the Hemingway-Pfeiffer Museum, Southern Tenant Farmers' Museum, Lakeport Plantation, Historic Dyess Colony, and Johnny Cash Boyhood Home. They have presented the idea of a Craighead County Museum twice, but both efforts failed for various reasons. Tjis hasn't stopped them.



A Craighead County Museum could be a living museum with exhibits showing the history on one floor and events held both inside and outside the museum. Structures of the buildings exhibited in the museum could tell the history. All the research, vertical files, maps, backup, books, photographs, and drawings would be kept at the museum for everyone to reference if researching their families or writing their contributions.

However, work can't begin without a building. The location has to be on a major street, easy to find. It has to be well-built using fire-resistant materials. It has to have adequate parking. It has to be attractive to draw interest, and it has to be handicap-accessible. Some sites considered are the Historic Federal Building, the house at 1419 S. Main, or various older buildings that are not using all their space. The museum could be a virtual museum.

We have to preserve our memories. Claudia and Ruth asked members to help them find a building so that the dream could become a reality.
