PROGRAM:

Caregiver Companion is a ministry that assists elderly and disabled citizens in Tippecanoe County.

Cameron Kuhl, the Executive Director, spoke to us today about the organization.
Caregiver Companion was started in 1995 by Sister Veronica Baumgartner. They provide non-medical assistance to those who wish to remain in their homes. This assistance improves the



quality of life of those needing care as well as their caregivers. The types of help provided are: companionship; respite breaks for caregivers; transportation; phone visits; grocery shopping either with or without the person receiving care; and yard care. When a potential "neighbor" requests assistance, an in-home assessment is done and then they are matched with a volunteer. The organization has three employees with an office on St. Ann's campus on Wabash Avenue. Their budget is \$180,000 per year with income from donations and grants. With forty volunteers, they serve the needs of eight-two neighbors. Last year 1300 hours of assistance were provided. More information can be found at caregivercompanion.org.

WHAT IS THE OPEN WORLD PROGRAM?

The Open World Program, operated by the Congressional Office for International Leadership, COIL, an independent U.S. federal agency, is a special program available to Rotary clubs in the United States through a grant secured by Rotary International.

The Open World Program was originally established as a Library of Congress-administered pilot project in 1999 to give emerging Russian leaders firsthand exposure to the American system of democracy through visits to local governments and communities in the United States. Since 2003 the congressionally sponsored program brings emerging leaders from Eurasian countries to the United States in order to give them firsthand exposure to the American system of participatory democracy and free enterprise. The principles of accountability, transparency, and citizen involvement in government are among the concepts emphasized by the Open World Program. The program emphasizes professional development, exchange, and cooperation. Key concepts include transparency, accountability, civic initiative, and volunteerism.
