# Program Summary - Mar. 19, 2025 John Mather Executive Director, Programs & Reentry Indiana Department of Corrections



Last week, Rotarian Donnie Emerson invited his colleague John Mather to speak to our club about the Indiana Department of Corrections' (IDOC) programs regarding preparing inmates for release from prison. John directs IDOC's re-entry programs. He shared that approximately 10,000 convicts are released from Indiana prisons each year. About 33% of those released go back to prison in the future. The IDOC maintains a Case Management program for each inmate. These programs assist incarcerated individuals in making life/behavior changes during their time in prison and facilitate their preparation for re-entry into the community by utilizing partnerships and commu-

nity resources. Case Management uses evidence-based principles combining assessments with a multi-disciplinary approach to reduce criminal thinking and behavior. Programs are tailored to the specific situations and needs of each inmate. They look at the individual's unique needs, risks of re-offense, how responsive they might be to various programs, and what intervention techniques have proven themselves to work with what type of person.

Statistics tell us that in Indiana, an incarcerated person who has not completed a GED is 2.8 times more likely to become a recidivist offender than one who has a high school credential. More specifically, the levels of recidivism increase as the level of education of the offender decreases: 56% of Below High School education offenders return to prison; 46% of High School educated offenders return; 31% of College educated offenders return. Further, the fact of having a job waiting for the released inmate is another major contributor to the likelihood of recidivism. An unemployed released inmate is 1.5 times more likely to return to prison than one who has found employment. At its core, post-release employment is a major predictor of recidivism, regardless of the nature of the individual's offense (i.e., violent, non-violent, drug, or sex offenses).

To effectively address the issue of reducing recidivism through employment postincarceration, Indiana has a number of programs that provide training to inmates while in prison - making them better qualified for employment upon their release. Most of the jobs available to released inmates are in the fields of Construction, Warehousing, Manufacturing, and Restaurants. IDOC offers vocational certifications in fields related to these industries, such as Culinary Arts, Welding, Building Trades, Logistics, Recreational Vehicle Maintenance, Horticulture, Barber/Cosmetology, and Business Technology. In addition, some inmates are able to further enhance their employability by obtaining advanced certifications outside of the corrections facilities in the areas of Welding, CNC Mill or CNC Lathe Operations, and Certified Production Technician. IDOC has a Division called HIRE (Hoosier Initiative for Re-Entry) that works with employers to place released inmates into full-time, benefitted employment. HIRE has its own Traffic Light" referral system that evaluates each inmate with a Green, Yellow, or Red light before being submitted to a prospective employer. To date, HIRE has more than 20,000 placements. In short, helping the inmate get a good job upon release greatly increases the likelihood that they will not visit an IDOC facility in the future...


