DANA GAMBY TELLS CLUB ALL ABOUT SCOUTS

What used to be the Boy Scouts of America is now Scouting America.

It's open to both boys and girls.

Club member Dana Gamby is Eagle Creek District executive for the Great Smoky Mountain Council of Scouting America.

Scouting includes Cub Scouts, ages 5 to 12, Scouts BSA, ages 11 to 17, Sea Scouts, ages 14 to 20, Venturing BSA and Exploring Clubs, ages 10 to 20, Dana told the club last week.

Sea Scouts focus on water-related activities, Venturing Scouts focus on real-life adventures and Exploring Scouts focus on real-world activities, she said.

There are also STEM Scouts that focus on labs for science, technology, engineering and math, she added.

The Eagle Creek District includes Cumberland, Fentress, Morgan, Pickett, Roane and Scott counties, Dana said.

It serves 11 Scouting units (troops and packs) with 450 Scouts and 100 volunteers. Cumberland County has four units (three Scout troops and 1 Cub Scout pack), and she's looking to start one more pack, she said. There are 86 kids in the Cumberland County units, she said.

In her job, Dana helps Scouting units recruit Scouts and adult leaders, manages the volunteers and helps with fund-raising, she said.

She said she hopes to raise \$76,500 for the district this year, including \$43,500 for Cumberland County.
