

**Cranberry Adopt a Road Program** 

Did you ever wonder how we live in such a clean township? It's



because of volunteer groups like The Rotary Club of Cranberry Township Sunrise, and so many other organizations, groups, families, neighbors, companies, and individuals who participate in the Cranberry Township Adopt-A-Road program and volunteer their time to keep our community litter free. On a Saturday in October, a number of Rotary volunteers braved the chilly morning to clean up Powell Road (between Rochester and Freedom Roads). Thank you to all of our Rotarians who were able to participate and help make a difference in our

community.

Volunteers consist of individual township residents, members of local organizations, and township-based businesses. Altogether, 23 groups have committed to cleaning their adopted sections of roadway at least twice per year, adding up to 400 volunteer hours annually. On average, volunteers collect over 230 bags of litter! Between 1997 and 2022, more than 4,800 bags of litter have been collected, along with other debris such as scrap metal, wood, pipes, plastic, carpeting, tires, and more.




## **Erie Pints for Polio**

## Appalachia Mission Impact Club and Isaiah 117 House



Here are a few pictures of missionaries installing all the trim work, painting, and hanging doors in the first "Isaiah 117 House" in Butler, PA.

Isaiah 117 House, is a place where kids who are about to be adopted can go to meet with foster parents, or have supervised visits with parents coming out of some sort of rehab. Sometimes these kids can be at these houses from a few hours to a few weeks and currently there are no other programs that offer these types of accommodation. Until

Isaiah 117 House started, kids would be housed in corporate offices and conference rooms with their caseworkers. With the Isaiah 117 House program, they have a more comforting and relaxed environment to stay in with access to clothing, personal hygiene, and beds.





## **Appalachia Mission Impact Club**

We typically take anywhere from 50-70 adults and youth (youth range from those entering 9<sup>th</sup> grade through college) and perform very much needed repairs to homes in and surrounding Mullens WV. Repairs range from new roofs (Metal/shingle), windows and door replacement, Insulation, home underpinning, handicap ramps, electrical, and plumbing repairs, handicap showers/tubs, new siding and gutter work. In addition to spending time with the families we are working with in prayer and worship, we invite the entire community to share in fellowship by watching movies, playing games, and cooking everyone meals.


As we reflect on this year's fundraiser, we are filled with gratitude for the support of our community and the dedication of our fellow






#### Let's take a closer look together .....
