Our speaker on Feb. 18th

Our member, **Sonia Sotoglo** said she was born in Togo, in West Africa, and surely none of us had been there, but one of us **had** been. She came to the U.S. in 2005, studied marketing, studied theology at Mount St. Mary's University, and now works as a Rapid Rehousing Case Manager for Interfaith Works.

Sonia has a sister and three brothers, one of whom had mental problems and became homeless. Then, he was addicted to narcotics in a homeless shelter. That led her to create a foundation, CORE, to help homeless people in upper Montgomery County. She said they numbered about 1,000.

CORE provides **food** packages, once a week, with items that do not require cooking because most homeless people have no way to cook (although one 7-11 owner has agreed to let CORE clients use its microwave oven). Also, the foundation provides care packages with hygiene items, and school essentials for students. In addition, it has worked out an arrangement with Black Rock Center for the Arts to let its clients take showers there. Black Rock serves the community in many ways.

Since neither CORE nor its clients have offices, Sonia meets them at any location they agree on. **To raise funds**, she will hold an event that features artists and organize a charity walk. She is incorporating the organization and hopes to obtain grants and corporate scholarships. She is working on a documentary film to help spread the word, and she welcomes **financial support and volunteers**.

Asked how to help homeless people when one sees them on the street, Sonia suggested not giving them money. Instead, give them small bags of useful items. Also, treat them like humans. Talk with them. Sonia can be reached at info@thecorefoundationmc.org or by phone at 202-318-9494.
