Several people who were booked on a Viking Sky World Cruise planned to **donate books** to the CEF Zanzibar School, which is in a spice farming area on the island of Zanzibar, off the east coast of Africa. It provides free, high-quality education to girls, orphans and children from disadvantaged backgrounds. The group collected and packed eight boxes and two suitcases of books for children and embarked on the cruise, with high expectations.

However, **a Cholera outbreak** in Zanzibar prevented the ship from docking there. All might have been lost, but, no. Charlotte, a Rotarian on the ship, made contact with the **Rotary Club of Mombasa**, in Kenya, where the ship **could** dock, and the club agreed to transport the books. A member, named Peter, had a friend who owned a shipping company.

The next major problem was getting the books through Customs and into Kenya. Every box and bag was sniffed by two dogs and then opened and inspected. Also, a list of the books had to be sent to the Customs supervisor. It turned out that she was supportive and did not raise more obstacles. The books are at the port in Mombasa and are **scheduled to be shipped** on March 25th. The school director, Judi Palmer, is arranging for a person to receive them and clear them through Customs in Zanzibar.

Hooray for Rotary and all others who assisted.

Our Speaker on Tuesday, Linda Hembeck, was from the Science and Technology Corp. of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, or NOAA. She offered a professional presentation on "bad" Ozone in the Troposphere.Slide 5 said, "Air pollution kills an estimated seven million people worldwide every year. She discussed the Clean Air Act of 1953 and the role of the Environmental Protection Agency, which was established in 1970. She emphasized that the states can help but solutions to bad air must be **national** because winds blow ozone, and its precursor chemicals, across state lines. Then, she showed results of studies she had done

that related ozone to climate change, and **the correlation is very strong**. "Climate change is inevitable," she concluded. "If we do nothing, mortality and morbidity ... could be severe." Frightening? You bet!

Rotary Legislation: Every three years, Rotary International goes through a process of amending and adding to its rules, and these affect every club.
