Rotary Plans to Streamline, Modernize 4-Way Test

As we've seen in recent years, Rotary has shown an openness to updating and modernizing its ways to be more relevant for busy, 21st century members. We've seen this with flexible meeting formats, new membership categories, etc, and now, apparently even the 4-Way Test may change with the times. According to reports from the new Rotary Office of Greater Utility & Efficiency (ROGUE), RI officials are considering tweaks to the venerable test. And they're beginning with the name itself according to an unnamed source. "We're considering changing 4-way test, to 4-way quiz. Test sounds kind of harsh, don't you think? ... and just stresses out our members. Quiz seems less threatening."

But they're not stopping there. According to ROGUE Committee Chair Ima Wytegurl, the first test, "Is it the Truth," is also under scrutiny. "Let's face it, does anyone know what *the truth* is these days? Kind of an old school concept right? We're thinking of replacing the words *the truth* with *cool*. 'Is it cool?' just seems like a better way to go. Cool—you do it; not cool—you don't. What could be simpler?"

The second "test" is also apparently being streamlined. One unnamed ROGUE committee member said, "We're thinking of changing *Is it Fair to all concerned?* to *Is it fair to us?* Let's face it, it's unrealistic to think something could possibly be fair for everyone. As Rotarians we have to take care of ourselves. If it's fair to us, that should be good enough. Right?"

Others reported that the third test, Will it build goodwill and better friendships? is sorely out of date. "C'mon, test #3 sounds like a cross between something out of your great-grandma's etiquette book and an old Christmas carol. It needs a makeover." The source leaked that the leading candidate for substitute wording is simply, Will it be fun? "Hey, if it's fun, then it'll certainly spread goodwill ... whatever that means."

As of press time, the fourth test—Will it be beneficial to all concerned?—will just be dropped altogether. ROGUE member Nita Joint opined, "Four tests are way too many. We need to realize our members are busy and just don't have time for four tests. I personally have always been a big fan of 3-Way things, if you know what I mean."

Finally, ROGUE members unanimously decided to also reduce the preamble wording from *The 4-Way Testof the things we think, say, and do* to simply, *The 3-Way Quiz of things*. As one ROGUE member said, do we really think we should be telling our members what they can think, say, and do? It's a free country ya know."





This effort was funded by four separate grants from Rotary International, Rotary Zone 33/34 and the Rotary Club of Huntsville, totaling approximately \$130,000. Matching funds for these grants were received from the Rotary Club of Bonita Springs, the Rotary Club of Asheville and District 7670. Rotarians distributed the heaters with the help of boots-on-the-ground organizations, including Beloved Asheville, Valley Strong Disaster Relief, Swannanoa Communities Together, La Milpa, the Buncombe County Sheriff's Office, the Jewish Family Center, ABCCM and Asheville City Schools. Our thanks go out to Rotary International Zones 33/34, District 7670, the Rotary Clubs of Huntsville and Bonita Springs and all the other organizations for making this a reality. The Rotary Club of Asheville is shifting its focus to disaster recovery by initiating rebuilding and repair projects with the Asheville Area Habitat for Humanity.

Rotary Club of Asheville Offers Disaster Relief Grant to Support Recovery Efforts in Western North Carolina

ASHEVILLE, N.C. (November 22, 2024) — The Rotary Club of Asheville has launched a Disaster Relief Grant program to aid in the recovery and rebuilding efforts following the devastation caused by Tropical Storm Helene.

Rotary Clubs and individuals in the United States and Canada have contributed more than \$150,000 in donations to help support this initiative, which will provide financial assistance to eligible organizations in our community.

Nonprofits, schools, and government agencies with 501(c)(3) status are invited to apply for grants of up to \$5,000. The Rotary Club of Asheville Disaster Relief Committee will evaluate applications on a bi-weekly basis, ensuring that funds are distributed efficiently to those with the greatest need.

"Our mission is to support recovery and rebuilding efforts for those affected by Tropical Storm Helene," said Janet Whitworth, chair of the Rotary Club of Asheville's Disaster Relief Committee. "We are proud to collaborate with Rotary Clubs across North America to help Western North Carolina."

Interested organizations are encouraged to submit a project budget, their most recent IRS Form 990 or year-end financial statements, and any supplementary materials. Applications can be <u>submitted online</u> or emailed directly to Janet Whitworth by <u>clicking this link</u>.

The Rotary Club of Asheville will continue the grant process until the funds have been fully utilized, to make sure that the community receives the necessary support to rebuild and recover.
