Easy Make Ups!

You can now receive make up credit through the Internet. Just go to the web-site: www.rotaryeclubone.org. This site gives you another make up opportunity you can do from the comfort of your own home. This is a fully chartered club by Rotary International. You can choose a 'Program' that you want to read, answer some question, and print out the makeup slip. All they ask is that the person donate the cost of maintaining the site. If you contribute the cost of your meal, please be sure and let Mary Sizemore or Kristen Hoskins know so that you will receive meal credit on your next statement.

Click on Rotary Resources. Then click on Club Search. Under Search, select Clubs. WELL KNOWN POLIO OVERCOMERS

Senator Mitch McConnell and his Polio plight became a hot topic of debate in political circles in 2025. But it appears he did in fact have a polio diagnosis as a child.

He came down with flu-like symptoms. While he eventually recovered, his left leg did not. It was paralyzed. He couldn't run as fast as the other kids. When he put on a swimsuit, his left leg had a narrower circumference, leaving him embarrassed. Even now, he says he has trouble climbing stairs.



McConnell was diagnosed with polio in 1944 at the age of 2, nearly 10 years before the polio vaccine was developed. In his memoir, McConnell

wrote that he received care in Warm Springs, Ga., at the polio treatment center founded by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who had suffered from the disease.

Mitch McConnell's earliest childhood memory is the day he left the polio treatment center at Warm Springs, Georgia, for the last time.

Eric did then come forth and introduce Sherea Burnett, executive director of Partners Ending Homelessness in Guilford County. (Barry didn't convince her either as she declared a strong "Go Heels!" shout out) Sherea dispelled a lot of myths and wrong information about the homelessness situation in our county. First she made it clear that Homelessness is an experience, it is not a person. Hopefully they won't always be homeless. Then she expressed frustration that as we try and fix homelessness, wea re not including those experiencing homelessness in the conversations.

To help us more clearly see the picture, she shared a slide of info from January 2024 that painted us a picture of the homeless population. Of the 665 experiencing homelessness then, 77 suffered from mental illness and 44 had substance use disorders. (continued on page six)

She made it clear that some of those problems came about BECAUSE they were homeless. It is not why they are homeless. The vast majority are males and also African American. Some are experiencing short term homelessness. They maybe had to make a choice of whether to pay their rent or fix their car, pay medical bills, purchase medications, or buy food. That brings to light another issue and that is that there is not necessarily a problem of having enough affordable housing. The problem is often having the resources to afford any housing period.

The problem is not going away. Sherea said they added 100 households (not persons) to their data in 2025. A household can sometimes by 6-8 people. United Way's 211 calls about housing in the quarter 12/27/24 to 3/27/25 totaled over 3,000. The number of clients handled by the 15 partner agencies always is on the rise. Amazingly, there are more evictions daily in Guilford County than their agency can get placed in a home in the same daily time frame. In fact, Sherea says that High Point is 6th in the State in evictions. She did not speak to favorable of High Point landlords and their rush to evict.

Mya Otero-Alvarez, P.E.H.'s fundraising coordinator, joined Sherea at the podium and enlisted our help in an effort to get everyone involved. They stress Connection, Support, and Advocacy. Their non-profit does not provide housing or rent assistance. Though they do have some limited funds to help in certain situations, often pertaining to an eviction. She encouraged us to participate in Applebee's (on John Gordon Lane) all day event on April 23rd where 25% goes to P.E.H.

A number of questions were raised by those in attendance and those that deal with these impacted individuals and households offered their perspectives, particularly Jane Liebscher (United Way), Ryan Ross (Open Door Ministries), and Eric Foushee (Mental Health Assoc.)..

I think everyone left the meeting with a different perspective of those experiencing homelessness.

Don Shaw presented the speaker gift and thanked our visitors, Debbie Mellinger Bell and Shaylene Tootle-Grbus. He invited us to rise and join in the Four Way Test before adjourning the meeting.
