Service Projects Chair Pam Hilbert had attended PETS (President Elect Training Session) this past weekend. This is a requirement for the President Elect and also to enable the club to be eligible for District grants. This is an energizing and fun experience for all who attend. She said she came away with a long list of things to consider for her upcoming Presidency in July. She also reminded all to bring Easter cards and candies for the micro-project for April 8, these will be used for the Meals-on-Wheels clients.



President Tim introduced our speaker for today, Amanda Lyles with Coastal Federation. She has a Bachelors degree in Political Science and works in the Public Outreach area. She said working at Coastal Federation is her dream job. She grew up in Newport and her grandfather taught her the wonders of the waterways and the respect of keeping them safe. The mission of the Coastal Federation is to empower coastal residents and visitors from all walks of life to protect and restore the water quality and critically important natural habitats of the NC coast. Dr. Braxton Davis is the Executive Director. The federation was formed in 1982 and then, Todd Miller was the Director. Now he serves as an advisor to the Ex. Director. As the Outreach Officer, Amanda works with a variety of groups. They set up education programs in the county schools, and their outreach includes 20 coastal counties. They also set up workshops for professionals promoting economical and environmental programs. The largest pollution problem now is storm water runoff. The Newport River is largely affected by this run off and occasionally is closed due to it. Wet lands restoration is a big focus also. The North River wet-lands preserve is a new project with the Federation. One of the other living shore line projects they have been working on for a while is the project at the Community College. There they established oyster bands that eventually causes the shoreline to fill in and marsh grass is planted to stabilize it. This not only stabilizes the shoreline but creates oyster beds that can support the economy and environment. Another big project is to collect and reduce marine debris. They have removed over 200 sunken boats along the shoreline since 2021. Also, they partner with local fishermen during the off seasons to help remove lost crab pots and other marine debris. There is a daily news service, CoastalReview.org that is produced by the Federation. Another large project is the new facility that is being built at the present location to house more research facilities. They hope it will be completed in 2026. Amanda was able to answer several questions asked by Rotary members.



Happy Dollars were solicited by Pam Hilbert who was able to collect many dollars for our program and other Happy things.
