


Mary Kurek introduced our speaker for the day, Cindy Schersching, Chair of the Pine Knoll Shores Council on Aging. Cindy and her husband, Tom Kies, have lived in Pine Knoll Shores for 20 years. After moving from the Washington D.C. area, Cindy continued to work at home for a Marketing Research company. About 5 1/2 years ago she became a member of the Board for the Council on Aging. Joan Lamson, a previous Mayor of PKS, resolved through their Town Board to support PKS as an "Age-Friendly Community". In 2022 a group of eight to ten active participants met to discuss the future purpose of this designation as an "Age-Friendly Community". Thus the Council on Aging was formed. So, what was needed to improve the quality of life in PKS for the aging residents? In developing the answers to this question, they found several very important concerns of the residents. Residents want to stay in their homes as they age, do not want to leave their friends, business community, church family and neighbors. The Council on Aging conducts various meetings with residents to get information and spread information about what is available through the Council. When the question was asked, "What would make you leave PKS?" and "What will help you stay in PKS?", there was, of course, a variety of answers. However, there were many of the same concerns. One concern expressed by some was the availability of good medical care. Surprisingly, another concern was food security. More isolated people are in need of

intervention by the organization. The Council has tried to put together lists of sources of information, such as meal deliveries, home repair business that they feel comfortable with, house cleaning, and medical needs. They try to gather in convenient meeting places to pass on this information to residents and learn about other needs they might have. According to the last census, the average age of residents at PKS is 66 years. They also work with the County Board of Aging, give information about Home Health services, especially when a partner may be dealing with dementia of their wife or husband. The Council's aim is to connect residents to solutions and motivate residents to reach out when they have a need. Certainly a wonderful source of good information for Pine Knoll Shores residents.
