FIRE-PROOF YOUR HOME

Enclose eaves, vents, and soffits with metal mesh screens to block embers. Apply fire-resistant treatments to wooden decks, patios, and fencing. Keep gutters clean to prevent dry leaves from catching fire.

3. Fire-Resistant Windows and Doors

Use tempered glass windows, which withstand heat better than regular glass. Install metal or solid-core wood doors, which are less likely to catch fire. Use weather stripping to seal gaps and prevent embers from entering. Consider installing fireproof shutters for added protection.

4. Interior Fire Safety Measures

Choose fire-resistant furniture and curtains, such as those made from wool or treated fabrics.

Store flammable materials like gasoline, propane, and paint in sealed containers away from heat sources.

Place fire extinguishers in key locations, including the kitchen, garage, and living areas.

Install smoke alarms in every room and test them monthly.

Consider a fire sprinkler system for added home protection.

5. Emergency Preparedness

Develop and practice a fire escape plan with all household members.

Keep a fireproof safe for important documents and valuables.
